










SC Hispanic Population by Urban/Suburban/Rural Status

HISPANIC POPULATION IN THE SOUTHEAST **REGION GREW** FASTER THAN THE U.S. OVERALL.

Within the region, SC had the fastest Hispanic population growth.

Despite this growth, SOUTH CAROLINA still has a smaller Hispanic population as a % of total population than OTHER SE² STATES.

5.5% vs. 7.4%



Compared to the SE², SC has a higher % of Hispanics from MEXICO and the CARIBBEAN, and a lower % from CENTRAL AMERICA.





NOTES:

- 1. In this document, Hispanic/Latino refers to individuals of Mexican, Caribbean, Central or South American, or other Spanish/Hispanic/Latino origin, ancestry, or culture.
- 2. The Southeast Region (SE) is defined as Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, and Virginia. Florida is considered unique, given its large historic Hispanic population, and therefore is not included with other Southeastern states.
- 3. ZIP Code Tabulation Area (ZCTA): a census enumeration unit roughly equivalent to a USPS ZIP Code service area
- 4. Caribbean: persons of Puerto Rican, Cuban, or Dominican origin.

All data are from the US Census Bureau, 2016 ACS 1-Year Estimates, with the following exceptions: SC Hispanic population by ZCTA (including urban/suburban/rural) and county (2015 ACS 5-Year Estimates), 2000 population (Census 2000 SF1), and 1990 population (1990 Census SF1).
